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A Night of Music under the Stars at Harmony Borax Works

DEATH VALLEY, CA – Death Valley National Park is hosting a luminaria event at Harmony Borax Works on Saturday, December 30th from 5 pm- 7pm. Enjoy ranger programs on astronomy, history, and nature while listening to Irish folk music under the stars. Superintendent Mike Reynolds notes, “This is the first time the park has done this type of event, so we hope that you come out for it!”

Parking is limited, so carpooling is encouraged. The closest restrooms to the site are located at the Furnace Creek Campground. Visitors staying at the Furnace Creek Campground or parked at the visitor center can enjoy a one-mile, moonlit walk on a paved path.

Please plan to bring a flashlight, sturdy walking shoes, and warm clothing. The program is free and open to the public with the standard park entrance fee.

Death Valley National Park is the homeland of the Timbisha Shoshone and preserves natural and cultural resources, exceptional wilderness, scenery, and learning experiences within the nation's largest conserved desert landscape and some of the most extreme climate and topographic conditions on the planet. About two-thirds of the park was originally designated as Death Valley National Monument in 1933. Today the park is enjoyed by about 1,300,000 people per year.
